
SOLID WASTE PROGRAM Mission Statement

"Provide reliable, cost-effective collection of residential and commercial recyclables, greenwaste, food scraps and refuse through the City's franchised haulers, with a primary focus on maximizing diversion of solid waste from landfill disposal."

SOLID WASTE PROGRAM

- 2002 Council Policy:
 - Develop a cost-effective solid waste management system
 - Maintain compliance with State mandates
 - Work to be a recycling leader in California
 - Reduce the volume of solid waste disposed through aggressive diversion programs
 - Minimize the City's exposure to liability
 - Conduct public outreach to City residents and businesses regarding benefits of participation





Why is Diversion a Priority?

- Burying waste in a landfill is the most expensive disposal option – short-term and long-term
 - Current tipping #72.75/ton
 - Tipping fees will continue to increase until closure
 - Every ton of waste buried carries long-term liability
 - The City will "own" every ton buried for many years
 - Case Study: Las Positas Landfill

Why is Diversion a Priority?


- In contrast...
 - Processing of source separated comingled recyclables generates revenue
 - No future or unknown liabilities
 - Composting of food scraps limits methane production at the landfill

Why Target Food scraps?

- Environmental impacts of organics in a landfill
- Financial benefits
- Greatest opportunity for recovery
- Single largest portion of waste stream
- Produces valuable agricultural commodity


City of Santa Barbara Waste Characterization 2009





Strong Candidates: Food-Serving Establishments

Typical Restaurant Waste Stream



Example: Increased Diversion at Restaurant

CURRENT

Landfill 12 yards/ week

Recycle 4 yards/ week

16 yards/ week
Recycling Rate= 25%

PROPOSED

Landfill 2 yards/ week

Recycle 8 yards / week Food scraps
6 yards / week

= 16 yards/ weekRecycling Rate= 87%

Business Sector Food Scrap Collection Program

- Pilot: April 2007 to October 2009
 - 12 initial businesses
- November 1, 2011: City-wide Program
- Established discounted rates (15% of the price of equivalent trash services) for all recyclables including food scraps

Business Sector Food Scrap Collection Program

- As of October 1, 2011:
 - 150 participants: 135 businesses and 15 schools
 - Collecting average of 2,500 tons of food scraps per year
 - Hauled to Engel and Gray Inc. in Santa Maria for composting
 - Program still incentivized through rate structure (now 30% of the price of equivalent trash services)

Schools

- 18 Schools
- 95 yards³ per week
- Controlled arena
- Cost savings
- Teaching tool
- Future stewards
